Odd Time Signature Lesson Series Lesson #6 - Playing in 6/4 (SVDL71)

Welcome to the sixth lesson in my "Odd Time Signature" lesson series. I this lesson I will teach you how to create a series of nice sounding 6/4 grooves. We will start by using a 3-3 subdivision. Then we'll use a 4-2 and 2-4 subdivision. A dotted line will appear in each measure so you can easily see the sub-divisions.

For our first example we'll combine a very simple 3/4 pattern from lesson #1 with a simple 3/4 pattern from lesson #2. Count out loud until you get a good feel for the pattern.



For this version we'll combine example 6 from lesson #1 with example 5 from lesson #2. Remember, I'm simply combining the 3/4 examples from the first three lessons in this series. Practice these grooves then try some different combinations of your own.



For the next two grooves we'll combine patterns from lesson numbers 1 and 3.





The next three grooves were created by combining two 3/4 patterns from lesson #2. This one combines examples 2 and 3 from lesson #2.


Here we'll combine examples 3 and 12 from lesson #2



Now we'll combine examples 9 and 2 from lesson #2.



The next three grooves were created by combining the patterns from lesson numbers 2 and 3. This first one is very simple and very sparse. Practice it slowly until you get a good feel for the snare drum placement. And if it helps, count out loud.



Here's a catchy little groove.



Now we'll break out the ghost notes (\bullet). Be sure to play them as softly as possible, at about 1" off of the drumhead.



The next 4 grooves were all created by combining examples from lesson #3. Once again, we'll start out by playing a very sparse pattern.

Here, we'll combine examples 2 and 7 from lesson #3.



Now, we'll add some ghost notes and funk things up a bit for the next two grooves.





For the following four grooves we will use a 4-2 subdivision. That means we will be combining groups of four and two. This first example combines a simple 4/4 pattern with a very basic 2/4 pattern.




This groove was created by combining example 3 from lesson #5 with example 5 from lesson #4.



Now it's time for some more ghost notes. Remember to play them as softly as possible.



I love how ghost notes can totally change the character of a groove. See what the previous groove would look and sound like without the ghost notes.



Next we'll use a 2-4 subdivision. For this groove we will combine example 4 from lesson #4 with example 3 from lesson #5.



Here we will combine example 6 from lesson #4 with example 7 from lesson #5.



For our final example we'll once again add some ghost notes to the groove and funk things up.
